COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will award students the opportunity to work on projects and gain understandings that exist outside of any one Faculty. By working in classes open to all, students will have opportunities to discuss interdisciplinary topics and explore questions from multiple perspectives. The three core classes attended by all students in the course will focus on topics of such as community engagement; communication; and equity and inclusion. Beyond these classes, students will choose three one-week modules from a series of modules that will explore questions and acquire skills based on questions focused on the series of community, social and scientific concerns. Each module is led by a different instructor providing varied views and perspectives within the teaching team. Through this course students will work towards acquiring a greater appreciation and understanding of the diverse skills and knowledge required to effectively inquire into the important questions surrounding the Hamilton community.

COURSE OBJECTIVES/LEARNING OUTCOMES

- 1. Describe how improved communication skills can lead to more impactful research practices.
- 2. Reflect upon the impact on skills gained to students individual learning.
- 3. Evaluate the impact of course initiatives into the students future learning.
- 4. Assess the value of applying the viewpoints from multiple disciplines into a single issue of the Hamilton community.

ASSESSMENT AND COURSE DELIVERABLES

Please note that INSPIRE 1A03 is a graded 3-unit course that will appear under the Intersession 2022 session.

This course will be composed of the following assessment components:

1. Course Reflection and Participation – 10%

Students will be assessed on a 500-word course reflection discussing how the course may (or have may not) altered their perspectives on their own learning. A portion of the grade will be for attendance in each of the two core classes. Full details of the reflection assignment and participation will be posted on Avenue to Learn.

2. Modules Deliverables – 90%

Students will be choosing three modules that each contain deliverables worth 30% of their final grade. While the specifics for each module are different, they revolve around reflections and participation and do not contain final exams.

ASSIGNMENT DEADLINES AND MISSED/LATE WORK

Assignment Deadlines & Missed/Late Work: Students are expected to hand in all assignments on the specified due dates. Late submissions will be subject to a penalty of 20% per day (including weekend days). Assignments submitted after the beginning of class on the due date will be counted as one day late. No assignments will be accepted after the last day of classes. Given that some course assignments require electronic submission, you should familiarize yourself with the Avenue to Learn Assignment in advance of the deadlines and ask for assistance, as necessary. Problems with electronic submission WILL NOT be accepted as an excuse for lateness.

AUTHENTICITY / PLAGIARISM DETECTION

Students who do not wish their work to be submitted through the plagiarism detection software must inform the Instructor before the assignment is due. No penalty will be assigned to a student who does not submit work to the plagiarism detection software. All submitted work is subject to normal verification that standards of academic integrity have been upheld (e.g., online search, other software, etc.).
